Scotland can have a bolder parliament and a better nation

E HAVE BEFORE us an opportunity to make a great impact on future generations by choosing a Parliament that will face up to the challenges of our times.

The Holyrood election offers us the chance to transform Scotland and create the kind of society that people want to live in. Scottish Greens can deliver a bold and compelling vision that will create a better Scotland for all.

We can create a future for all our children. We can end fracking now and forever. We can create 204,000 jobs in low carbon industries, to transform our economy. We can harness the power in our land. We can create good homes for all.

With a strong team of Green MSPs transforming our politics Scotland can flourish. With new powers on the horizon we can focus on radical change. We can make sure land, energy and development is owned for good, for community good and for the good of the environment.

We can keep our ferries in public hands and bring our

railways into social ownership. We can give power to people both through renewable energy and through creating radical local democracy. Scotland can end the scourge of bad housing. We can stop runaway rent rises and we can regulate letting agents and dodgy landlords. We can build thousands of new houses. We can push for real change in who owns and controls land; in community and public ownership of energy; and giving people the same rights as developers in planning decisions.

High quality public services are the bedrock of our society and are widely supported. Scotland can fund its public services, reduce inequality and raise more revenue with fair taxes on wealth, land, and property. After eight years of the council tax freeze, it is time to be bold and tackle inequalities in wealth. With progressive local taxation we will strengthen local democracy and provide local communities with greater freedom and choice over local services. At the national level we will support progressive taxation that better reflects people's incomes.

Communities are up in arms about fracking and Greens have an impeccable track record of



opposing fracking and other dirty fossil fuel developments. We are the only party calling for an all-out ban, which can be achieved using the powers already devolved to Holyrood. The scientific evidence is compelling that fracking and unconventional gas extraction are too dangerous and that it's unnecessary and distracts from renewables investment.

We can ensure that Scotland uses its existing powers in planning to ensure that unconventional gas extraction does not take place beside our homes, our shores and vital agricultural assets, nor anywhere in Scotland.

With a Parliament that is bold, that is prepared to be radical and that wants to transform Scotland we can begin the much-needed transition to industries that can thrive in the new economy. We can create a socially just nation. A nation fit for our children and grandchildren. Scotland can be better, but only with a bolder Parliament.

Andy has served as a Specialist Adviser to the House of Commons Scottish Affairs Committee and represented the Scottish Green Party on the Commission on Local Tax Reform.

MARK RUSKELL Mid Scotland and Fife





Environment Mark Ruskell is a councillor, having been elected as Stirling Council's first SGP representative in 2012. His second elected office, Mark previously held the position of SGP MSP for Mid Scotland and Fife between 2003-07. During this time he was Deputy Convenor of the Parliament's Environment and Rural Affairs Committee he introduced legislative proposals on climate targets, liability for GM crops, and successfully protected the Fife coastline from oil transfers.

MAGGIE CHAPMAN North East Scotland

Social Justice, Housing &



Welfare Maggie Chapman is Coconvener of the Scottish Greens and a trade unionist. She was a member of the Smith Commission and COSI A's Commission on Strengthening Local Democracy. Maggie served as an Edinburgh councillor for eight years and was the first politician in Scotland to call for the introduction of a Living Wage. She lives in Dundee where she works for a women's charity, and is Rector of Aberdeen University.

SARAH BEATTIE-SMITH South of Scotland Infrastructure,



Investment & Transport Originally from just outside of Biggar, Sarah is a SGP activist, writer and artist. Sarah studied sculpture at the Edinburgh College of Art and went on to serve two terms as President of the Students Union before doing another degree in economics, social policy and political philosophy. She has worked in the Party's Policy Committee and is currently a contributor to the Bright Green website.

ROSS GREER West of Scotland Europe and External Affairs

Ross is



currently the Scottish Greens' Development Officer. Prior to his work in the Scottish Greens, Ross was the Communities Advisor at Yes Scotland and was involved in the campaign for Scottish independence. If elected Ross will become the youngest MSP in the history of the Scottish Parliament.

REGISTRATION, INFORMATION AND MERCHANDISE STALL

CHILD PROTECTION **AT CONFERENCE**

SGP considers all persons under the age of 18 children for the purposes of this policy.

As an organisation that has members as young as twelve, we have a duty to inform and support all our members in upholding our child protection policy. The following will help you to know what to look for and what to do if you have any concerns during Conference.

What constitutes a risk?

- Witnessing an incident involving a child that causes you concern
- A child tells you they are being abused or neglected or are at risk of being abused or neglected
- Someone tells you that a child

is at risk of abuse or neglect, even if the child has no connection to the SGP.

What do I need to do?


If a child tells you they are at actual or potential risk:

- Take them seriously
- Don't ask unnecessary questions
- Don't promise to keep the information confidential
- Make a note using the child's words and date them
- Contact your branch convenor, the Child Rights Volunteer or local social work department
- Don't contact the child's parents/guardian
- Don't attempt to investigate the situation
- If you are concerned about the immediate safety of a child, contact the police.

If you suspect an adult or child is posing a risk to child protection:

- Contact your branch convenor or Elaine Davis, the Child Rights Volunteer, who can be reached through the information desk
- If you are concerned about the immediate safety of a child, contact the police.


