Welcome to Dunfermline!

We are delighted to welcome you and this year's Autumn Conference to Dunfermline.

After just over two years of Scottish Greens in Government, this weekend provides an opportunity to reflect on

how far we have come and how much work still needs to be done to create a country that meets the needs and ambitions of its people.

Free bus travel has broadened the horizons of our young people, the rent cap has secured the homes of tenants, and record funding for nature has started to halt the slow tide of biodiversity loss.

These successes are Scotland-wide and here in Dunfermline and West Fife we continue our fight to turn our historic mining communities Green. But this must be only the beginning. Rising to the twin challenges of the climate and nature crises demands bold, radical politics, which does not run scared when we come under attack by those defending the status quo.

We have a long and proud tradition of radical politics here in Fife. Being nestled between the North Sea, the

Highlands and the Central Belt, Fife combines rural agriculture with urban sprawl, thriving greenspaces with postindustrial communities.

Many of these rural and urban industries alike are still recovering from being abandoned by governments and corporations that cared as little about people as they did the planet.

Fifers are proud of their history of trade unionism and ardent left-wing politics, with the UK's last Communist MP Willie Gallacher representing West Fife until 1950, and communist



councillor Willie Clarke representing Ballingry until his retirement in 2016.

Dunfermline offers lessons in inheritance, from the pride of our Peacocks to the glory of our "Glen". Friendship and trade with our European neighbours put pantile roofs over homes; the sharing of wealth can turn privileges like access

to knowledge, learning and green spaces into things available to all; kingdoms have futures without kings.

The past we inherit – a fairer, greener, more democratic future we build.

Accessibility and Inclusion



Year in Review







Scottish Greens are leading the change across Scotland

It has been just over a year since we all gathered in Dundee for our 2022 Autumn Conference.

The past 12 months have shown Scotland the impact we can have, advancing climate action and social justice in Parliament, councils and within our communities.

While the Tories have lurched from one disaster to another, we have acted to counter their attacks on nature here in Scotland. Lorna Slater introduced the game-changing £60m Nature Restoration Fund, created as part of our co-operation agreement with the Scottish Government.

"A dark day for devolution" is how Maggie Chapman described the 16th of January, as she reflected upon Downing Street's decision to block the Gender Recognition Reform Bill (GRR) using a little known clause in the Scotland Act known as Section 35. It was a cynical push to pursue its toxic culture war and distract from its own failings.

Over 12,000 people joined us in writing to the Secretary of State for Scotland to demand he lift the block on the GRR.

Despite the challenges from Westminster, in October we delivered

The Green bloc at September's rally for Independence in the EU was a fantastic moment for our movement. It was the first time since the pandemic began that a rally of that scale had taken place, and we couldn't have made it clearer that we are committed to delivering a fairer, greener, independent Scotland

In a crucial step, Scottish Green Minister for Tenants' Rights Patrick Harvie introduced a rent cap and extended eviction protections for private renters across Scotland. These emergency measures have protected hundreds of thousands from profiteering rent hikes.

Ross Greer's campaign to stop the garish Flamingo Land 'resort' at Loch Lomond saw a huge boost, with over 73,000 people using our portal to lodge objections, making it the most objectedto planning application in Scottish history.



Our fantastic councillors have also been working in town halls and city chambers around Scotland to tackle the cost of living crisis and climate emergency at a local level.

We have seen Councillors Holly Bruce and Kayleigh O'Neill bringing motions



on feminist town planning in their areas, supported motions across the country to ban single-use vapes and many have campaigned against dangerous climate vandalism in their wards.

There was a huge wave of support for Gillian Mackay's Safe Access Zones Bill which had cross-party support within minutes of it being published. Gillian's bill has now been officially lodged and will work its way through the legislative process in the coming months.

One of the highlights, of course, has to be the Holyrood Dog of the Year Awards, this year we had two Green contenders running to be top dog: Mark Ruskell, with a four year old three-legged Greyhound called Joy; and Gillian Mackay, who was joined by Alfie the cocker spaniel. In the end the pawbulic voted for Joy and Mark as they celebrated their win with a call to end greyhound racing in Scotland.

Another long-running animal welfare campaign from the Scottish

Greens came to a jubilant end this year as Ariane Burgess welcomed the introduction of the Hunting with Dogs Act, with which Scotland has become the first part of the UK to close the loopholes and end fox hunting for good.

Scotland's transportation has felt the difference of having Scottish Greens in Government, as we've brought ScotRail and the Caledonian Sleeper into public ownership and begun a pilot project of scrapping peak rail fares. We believe public transport should be for people, not profit.



With Scottish Greens in the room we have challenged the failed drug policies of the past and supported radical reform of the Scottish Government's policies. They now closely align with our own on decriminalisation and the urgent need for safe consumption rooms.

As we meet again, it's worth reflecting on the difference that we have made, together, as a movement. Our progressive policies are lifting over 90,000 children out of poverty, making it easier, cheaper and safer to get around without a car and working to protect our planet for future generations. That is the real reason we joined this cause: to build a fairer, greener Scotland.


When citizens come together to make plans about the place they know best, Scotland's towns, cities and villages can flourish.

Mark was born in East Anglia before moving to Scotland when he was 12, he studied at Edinburgh College before moving to Stirling University which is where his green activism began. As a student of Environmental Science, he found himself getting involved with numerous green campaign groups on campus.

Ahead of his historic election in 2003, Mark worked as a Regeneration Officer with Midlothian council before joining Soil Association Scotland to work on project to link farms with communities, this work ended abruptly in May 2003 as he was elected to be the first Scottish Green MSP for Mid Scotland and Fife.

How did you feel after your election in 2003?

Elated and excited to be part of that Green surge, I'd been an activist for a while, and helped get our first MSP elected in 1999, but 2003 saw our first group in what became known as the 'Rainbow parliament'.

The Rainbow parliament was led by a coalition of Labour and the Liberal Democrats and was still the very early days of devolution, it must have been very different to work in compared to our parliament today

It was still early days for the institution. We had to fight to get issues like climate change taken seriously and it was hard to win votes. The workload of MSPs and their teams has grown massively over the years especially as more powers have come to Holyrood.

Obviously 2007 was not the best election for the Scottish Greens – we went from a group of seven down to two MSPs following a tight squeeze at the election – but you kept going and continued to campaign for a fairer,

greener Scotland. What was your driving force through that time that helped you become a councillor and then get back into Parliament?

I was gutted to lose the seat, but felt even more committed to the party and our mission. Time away gave me more real world experience. Getting the breakthrough to win the first Green council seat in Stirling was a boost and the role taught me a huge amount.

What do you feel was the impact of the 2014 independence referendum on the party?

The 2014 referendum brought so much energy from new members who joined in the months after the result. I knew the tide was finally turning for us in 2016 but couldn't quite believe we'd taken the seat back again. The campaign team were awesome and a lot of tears flowed.

What has been your biggest take away from the first two years of Scottish Greens in Government?

Time is running out for the planet and we have to take every opportunity we can to effect change even if it feels like small steps. The Bute House Agreement has shifted the conversation in Government, I see its positive impact every day.

One of your focuses during this session has been on ending greyhound racing in Scotland, how has that work been and what can we expect from the future?

Greyhound racing is a barbaric "sport", and we've never been closer to banning it. With only one track left, the Scottish Government's now considering its position. I'm working with campaigners to ensure its days are numbered.



How Conference Works



The Party's Constitution and Policy Reference Document (PRD) have been voted on, and amended, by a succession of Party conferences on the basis of one member, one vote. The Standing Orders Committee (SOC) is responsible for ensuring conference rules are upheld, and for guaranteeing its smooth and democratic running. If you have an issue relating to conference procedures, please raise it with a member of SOC. SOC reports directly to conference, and its annual report - given during the AGM - must be approved by members.

MOTIONS

Motions have to be submitted 11 weeks before the Conference, amendments five weeks before. The intention is that branches can debate them and, if wished, agree to proxy votes or branch Amendments. **Emergency Motions are intended** to allow Conference to debate issues that have arisen since this deadline, and should be sent to soc@scottishgreens.org.uk seven days before the start of Conference, signed by two members. An Emergency Motion relating to events that have arisen since then can be submitted to SOC any time up until noon on the first day of conference (also signed by two members). Emergency Motions will be rejected if they could have been submitted in time for the first agenda, or are not concise and focused.

DEBATES AND VOTING

Motions are debated and voted on as follows:

- There is a short debate on the motion itself.
- Each amendment is then debated and voted on in turn. You have the choice of voting for, against or abstain.
- The final stage is a vote on the full motion, as amended (or not amended), and again the choice is between for, against or abstain.

At any point in the debate a member may ask (from the floor) to vote on referring a motion back to the relevant committee. That member would have to explain their reasons and another member would have to second that proposal. The chair may refuse that proposal or may put it to a vote, at their discretion.

Amendments will not be accepted from the floor if more than 1 members object, or if the chair refuses to allow them. It is unusual for all other members to agree to hear a proposed amendment from the floor, as this has not proved to be an effective way of deciding party policy.

Any member who can't attend Conference may delegate another member to vote on their behalf. This is called a proxy vote. No member may have more than eight proxy votes. Please email soc@ scottishgreens.org.uk if you would like to use your proxy vote.

HOW DO WE VOTE IN A HYBRID CONFERENCE?

To make our voting smooth and quick, we will be using a voting platform that will count online and

in-person votes. Each attendee who signed up for conference will receive a link and QR code to access the platform. These codes are unique to you. Please don't share them with anyone else and make sure to save the email.

During voting sessions, you will receive a prompt to vote. The platform will show the question and three voting options. "Yes" in green. "No" in red and "Abstain" in grey.

You can only cast your vote once.

AMENDMENTS & DECISIONS ON THE FLOOR

Amendments and any decision the Conference is making on the floor will be held by using the voting platform.

SPEAKING

Any member may speak during a debate. The facilitators of each

session will make clear how you can request to speak and any time limits. Please when you speak always begin by saying your name and branch. Please do not speak or request to speak unless called upon by the

> facilitator. Because of the number of people attending, not everyone who wishes to speak will be able to. Priority will be given to people with knowledge and experience on a subject, and to people who have not already spoken. You may ask a short auestion of the motion proposer - but this must be just that - a short question. The chair is there to ensure fair and smooth running of the session – please

respect their authority.

If you think in advance that you'd like to speak, please fill in a pink request-to-speak slip and hand it in to the chair's assistant as soon as possible, giving a note of any expertise or special interest you have in the topic. This will allow the chair to ensure an equal number of speeches for and against, and to give priority to those with background knowledge of the subject, rather than just those who are better at catching the chair's eye.

If you wish to respond to a point made during the debate, raise

your hand and you will be called if there's time. Please do not speak unless called upon and you have the microphone. Because of the size of the auditorium and the number of people attending, there will be very little time for speakers who have not filled in a request-to-speak slip.

FIRST TIME AT CONFERENCE?

There are special sessions for people new to Conference, one session held online in the week before Conference and one session will be held in-person on Saturday morning.

The in-person session will be happening on Saturday, 28th October from 9:00am to 9:45am in Wallace Suite 1.

COVID PROTOCOL



Throughout the years, Scottish Greens have taken our opposition to nukes on to the streets, into Parliament and put it on ballot papers across the country.


We've raised the alarm about dependence on the expensive and risky nuclear power stations at Torness, Hunterson and, previously, Chapelcross.
